They have asked me to determine a way to use our branch structure to reach out to more and different women—first to listen and later to have them join. How can we gather information from other sources to inform our efforts? How can we quickly and efficiently produce our own "market research" to supplement what we find elsewhere? How can we share and process that together in ways that empower action rather than creating information overload? Would you like to be part of this query? ## **United Nations Nongovernmental Organization Conference**

*Linda Hiebert Sekiguchi, representing the American Association of University Women, attended a United Nations (U.N.) Nongovernmental Organization conference, "Millennium Development Goals: Civil Society Takes Action," September 8-10 at the U. N. headquarters in New York City.*

The purpose of the conference was to review progress made on the goals agreed to by all member nations at the Monterey Summit in 2000. In an historic agreement, the United States promised along with all 189 member states, to make the world a better place. Goals were set to be achieved by the year 2015. Targeted are efforts to alleviate poverty; treat and prevent the spread of the HIV/Aids epidemic; provide universal primary education and gender equality; reduce child and maternal mortality rates; lower by half the number of people who suffer from hunger or lack access to safe drinking water; empower women; and create a global partnership to foster good governance and economic development in the least developed countries, including opening world markets to their goods.

The United States' chief obligation in this effort is with North-South partnerships, assisting poorer nations in the South to work on the areas of concern. In this regard, the U.S, under the current administration, promised that 0.7 percent of its gross National Product would be contributed to the cause. At the present time, the U.S. has reached only a 0.14 percent level. Some European nations have exceeded the 0.7 percent rate as their governments have given top priority to making the World a better and more secure place for all people.

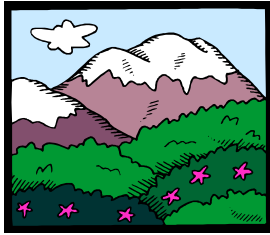
## **EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION**

Here we are at the beginning of a new year and so we must begin planning for contributions for the calendar year 2005. We will not receive our preliminary figures for 2004 from Association until the end of January and our final figures for the year 2004 until sometime in March, but I know that we did make several large contributions to the American Fellowship.

As you all know we applied to have our Nevada Named Unit changed into an American Fellowship. The name of our fellowship is the Jean Ford/Florence McClure, NV American Fellowship. I have not yet received confirmation that the change occurred, however, I did get a letter telling me that it would be voted upon at the September board meeting of the Foundation. As you all know this was a big commitment that the state took on and we are relying on each branch to do some kind of fund raiser to raise money for this fellowship. In order to fully fund this fellowship, we will need to contribute about \$4000 per year for the next twenty years. I urge every branch to set a goal for this fellowship based upon their membership and then decide how they will raise the money. If each branch would set as its goal the amount of \$10 per member, we could easily reach the \$4000 needed. As soon as I get the final figures for 2004, I will let each branch EF chair know the exact amount their branches have contributed. I would also like to reinstate a raffle or a silent auction at the convention to raise a little extra money toward this project. 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### ***Challenge and Opportunity***

These are difficult times for AAUW. As a member dues based organization our finances are relying on an ever-decreasing decline of the member base. We are able to see that at the branch and state level where we have smaller and fewer branches...with the occasional successful branch growth, which we applaud. Those growing branches are our pride and joy! Some Board of Directors budget decisions last summer were controversial, though there was an agreement that we needed change, modification and forward planning. Some details are below.

- Staff and volunteer leaders have made many across-the-board cuts. Staff positions were eliminated; a six-month hiring freeze was instituted; travel budgets were modified; Board members' reimbursement was curtailed; a restructure of how we work as an organization was begun.
- An effort to raise non-dues revenue has begun. The One in a Million Campaign was instituted, primarily to give AAUW Paid Life Members a chance to contribute to help the organization through tough times. A contribution of \$120 for those who wish to participate, will go towards rebuilding our reserves and ensure our future.
- An interim executive director, Pat Nichols, was employed, with his first task being to lead the organization through an evaluation of our structure. The goal of the Board of Directors is to hire a permanent executive director by the time of AAUW's Convention in DC in June, 2005.

- The Board of Directors voted to not pay International Federation of University Women (IFUW) dues for 2005. AAUW's annual dues would be \$200,000, plus an increase of 50% voted at the IFUW Conference in August in Perth. IFUW currently has a task force examining ways that the lack of AAUW's payment can be alleviated. There is a website with further information: [www.ifuwsupport.org](http://www.ifuwsupport.org).

AAUW is not alone in facing tough times...volunteer organizations throughout the country face similar challenges. That said we feel strongly that we must survive and thrive to continue our commitment to education and equity for all women and girls. Our strength is our dedicated leaders, members and staffs, who believe in our mission, are sure that we must prevail in order to continue the progress of those who went before us, and move forward with the conviction that the work is the right thing to do. 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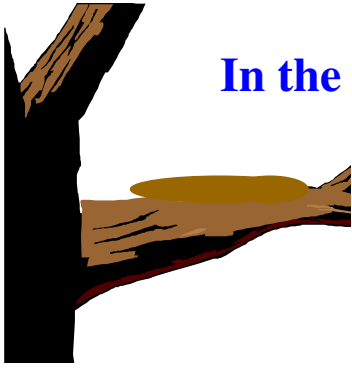
### ***Diversity***

## AAUW-IFUW

The International Federation of University Women (IFUW Conference, Perth, Australia August 2004)

I was privileged to attend the IFUW conference in Perth, Australia, August 4-10, 2004. How wonderful it was to meet and personally talk with representatives from over 36 affiliates of our 78 member associations. I enjoyed meeting friends I had visited previously as well as the opportunity to make new friends.

As with Stanford and Ottawa, I departed feeling exhilarated by the efforts and energy of our sisters around the world. I am amazed at how much few are able to accomplish! How impressive their projects are. Educated women are having a crucial impact within their individual countries. I am proud we can be associated with this group of motivated and influential women.

Initially, I attended the council meeting prior to the official opening of the conference. I was interested in President Nancy Rustad's presentation and the response of the council to the AAUW board decision. After her professional presentation, using slides to show the finances and trends in AAUW, Nancy was grilled for several hours. She stood up well under duress, answering questions calmly and succinctly. Obviously, there was great concern about the loss of AAUW's financial support and its implications for the future of AAUW involvement in the organization. In this meeting, great unhappiness was expressed by a number of affiliates as to the decision and its timing. Questions were asked about the input of AAUW members into the decision and how members had been informed. Several affiliates expressed kinship with AAUW and some pointed out that the same type of phenomenon (reduced revenue, reduced membership, and an aging group) characterizes their own organizations.

As an individual participant, I attended most of the business sessions since the interaction and statements of the various affiliates was of interest to me. I enjoy witnessing democracy in action within our international organization—similar, I believe to the type of systems practiced within the United Nations. The possibility for all, regardless of the size of the affiliate, to express views and be welcomed for their perspective, is gratifying. Plenary sessions prepared delegates for the business session about resolutions and constitutional amendments. Carolyn Donovan's report gave an excellent overview of resolutions.

The most important constitutional amendment concerned the raising of IFUW dues by six Swiss francs. Concern was expressed for smaller, poorer affiliates and their ability to pay. However, several programs exist for assistance. In addition concern was expressed about IFUW's loss of 40 per cent of its revenue (AAUW's dues) and its ability to continue its work, and maintain its staff. After much discussion, the six Swiss Franc increase was approved.

I was gratified that Barbara Carey was able to announce that through a Virginia Gildersleeve solicitation, over \$20,000 had been collected to contribute to the IFUW operating expenses. In addition, the Japanese association made a substantial gift.

The emergency resolution on establishing a task force for studying IFUW's structure and membership was wholeheartedly supported. A generous anonymous gift had been contributed with stipulations that the task force's main work be completed with recommendation by the end of this calendar year. The resolution additionally included the requirement that the recommendations be submitted to the council by early next year and that a vote is taken by the council on the recommendations electronically or by phone. I was most happy that Kathleen Laurila of AAUW was elected to serve another term as a vice president of IFUW. Her presentation to the body as a candidate was well received. She also did a great job of conducting several of the business sessions.

In the workshops on Saturday, I attended the stream on A Culture of Peace in which presentations were made by women from the U.S., Nigeria, Costa Rica, Israel, Uganda, Norway, Cameroon, and Ghana. On the seminar day at the University of Western Australia, as I sat in the session on the United Nations, I

realized during Griselda Kenyon's presentation that I had met her in a private home in Cape town, South Africa in 1995! I also attended The Way Forward in which various suggestions were given for curtailing expenditures and for streamlining IFUW systems.

I was excited to contribute materials from branches in CA and NM for our projects night notebook and display. Within our IAC committee, I had designated a group of affiliates for the five members in attendance. Each member was responsible for contacting a representative from those affiliates. The assignments assisted us in organizing informal discussions and in attempting to touch base with every affiliate represented. Reports on our conversations will be forthcoming. Unfortunately, only about two thirds of the affiliates were able to send representatives. I spoke informally with women from France, Switzerland, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Israel, Thailand, and South Africa. In addition other conversations were on-going during lunchtime and in the hallways.

The conference included opportunities for interaction in seminars, workshops, social events, and meals. The opening night and closing night galas were most enjoyable and memorable. Australia night featured local foods, wine, art, and indigenous dances. I was happy to be a part of the Virginia Gildersleeve Fund VGIF gatherings in which further information was given about projects and membership. Evelyn Mafeni, from Cameroon, was very vocal in her gratitude not only to VGIF, but to the AAUW Educational Foundation for funding. Five members of the AAUW International Affairs Committee (and ex officio, Nancy Rustad) were able to meet several times face-to-face. We touched base on activities and clarified roles.

All-in-all, I highly recommend attendance at IFUW conferences! I am looking forward to Manchester, England in 2007!
